Aboriginal Yarning circle is officially open!

In the last week of last term we officially opened the Yarning Circle with a smoking ceremony, dance, singing and of course a yarn or two. The creation of this cultural learning space has been a real community effort. Most of the building supplies were donated by generous companies in our local community or heavily discounted. We recognise and thank:

I must also recognise the work of our Community Liaison officer Kaylene Macmorran. Kaylene was very, very persuasive in getting people on board. She connected with our community to learn how to lead this project in a culturally sensitive way and was also able to source a grant from Disability Links to support the manpower and tools needed to bring the project together. This became a family project for Kaylene as her husband did all the technical surveying and marking out of the circle.

The steel disks around the outside of the circle are reminders of the styles of learning Aboriginal people have been using for tens of thousands of years. They have honed these learning practices so that they are powerful tools for learning skills, knowledge and above all culture. We know that learning in this way is culturally appropriate and beneficial for aboriginal people and they are high quality teaching practices for ALL learners. As our students use this space, they will be explicitly learning and using these techniques. This week students and staff are using the Yarning Circle to explore student opinions on mobile phones, positive behaviour for learning strategies and feedback on how teachers support students to engage in their learning.



HSC

The HSC exams are going well and as we head into the third week, our students have settled into the routine of the exams. We are proud of the mature way in which our Year 12 students have approached the exams. In just over a month we will all wait in anticipation of results which allow them to continue their journey towards their goals. Many of our students who have further study at university as their goal have already been accepted into their preferred university course through Early Entry schemes.



As Year 11 begin their HSC journey this term, may I remind parents that the first HSC assessments are scheduled for Weeks 9 & 10 (9 – 18th December). Students cannot be given leave during this time to take holidays and all absences during the assessment block must be supported by a Doctor's certificate. Good luck to Year 11 students and parents – we know you will be ready to take this first step.

SENIOR EXECUTIVE REPORT- FIONA CUNLIFFE



As we settle into the last term for the year it is an important time for students to reflect on their learning and be thinking about their future goals.

There are many attributes that today's learners need to develop. As a starting point we have begun by focusing on Vision.

To continue to build student engagement it is important for students to not only have an understanding of growth mindset but to apply this to their learning. To do this, students in Years 7, 10 and 11 have participated in a forum focusing on the importance of reflection and goal setting as a part of their vision.

Reflection can assist students to:

- better understand their strengths and weaknesses
- identify and question their underlying values and beliefs
- acknowledge and challenge possible assumptions on which they base their ideas, feelings and actions
- recognise areas of potential bias or discrimination
- acknowledge their fears, and
- identify areas for future improvement

Reflection can lead to greater self-awareness, which in turn is a first step to positive change – it is a necessary stage in identifying areas for improvement and growth which is a goal we want all students to be working towards.

The acts of setting, planning and accomplishing goals can also have a positive impact on student engagement. This practice, can give students direction, motivation, improve results and build self-esteem.

As a part of this process students are asked to reflect on their school report. Students needed to identify their areas of strength and their areas of weakness across their courses. Students were then asked to identify one gap they wanted to close across this semester and set a SMART goal in order to achieve this. This process will continue across all Year groups with all students setting goals to improve their learning in 2020.

Our 2020 Year 12 students have begun their HSC year by developing a better understanding of how the HSC works and the importance of understanding the assessment process. Student have been issued their Assessment Handbook and their first assessment block will be from the 5th December until the 18th December 2019. Students are encouraged to prepare early, ask for assistance if needed and seek feedback for improvement.

Students have also been issued with a diary to use to support with time management and a study skills handbook that we will be using to guide them with how to determine what the task is asking them to do, assist with breaking down tasks into manageable chunks, assist in structuring their assessments, and submitting a polished final product. Further structured support will be provided through forums to assist students to develop more effective learning skills and support them to achieve at their potential.



CAREERS



Enterprise is the theme in careers this term at CPHS, and there is no better time of year to encourage students to be enterprising – in other words, to show resourcefulness and initiative in their career development. Many local employers are gearing up to hire Christmas casuals and interviewing applicants for traineeships and apprenticeships. This is also the time of year when many registration for many TAFE courses and private colleges open and hold information sessions (some of which are compulsory to attend if you are applying for particular courses!). I've also been very pleased with the number of students approaching me to seek out resume support, and I'm more than happy to receive resumes via email to provide valuable feedback which may increase a student's chances of getting the opportunities they deserve.

I'd also like to congratulate the Year 12 2019 cohort, many of whom are reaping the rewards of being enterprising throughout their senior studies here at CPHS. Many students have contacted me to inform me that they have received either conditional or unconditional offers to university through early offer schemes, offers of full-time employment, traineeships and apprenticeships before even having finished their HSC exams. These are all fantastic achievements, and are truly a reflection of their hard work and persistence paying dividends. This is also a huge stress reliever in what is an otherwise stressful exam period for students, as the knowledge that opportunities await them can be of huge comfort. The YES program offered to our students through TAFE has been a great success, with the YES Fitness, Digital Media and Landscaping programs all being well received by our students at CPHS. It was very rewarding for me to have the opportunity to visit students participating in the

Digital Media and Fitness programs at Kingswood TAFE and see them flourish as adult learners. Students in our YES Landscaping program, which takes place each Wednesday on school grounds, have been working diligently with their TAFE teacher Damian to create a wonderful HSIE learning space featuring an archaeological dig site and a weather station. Last term they finished the initial fencing part of the project, and this term they have been able to commence work on the archaeological dig site. I was very fortunate this week to watch them as they learnt about basic formwork, concrete slabs, tool use and concrete ratios. A congratulations also goes out to all students who have graduated from the Productivity Bootcamp an 8 week intensive program designed for students who wish to pursue trades and careers in construction. I am so proud of students who put themselves out there on external programs such as these and make the best of the opportunities.





Students in Year 10 this term will be using their careers classes and time after their exams to organise themselves for Careers Enterprise Week from 2-6th December (Week 8). This week is an opportunity for students to develop and practise the skill of being enterprising. This means making choices that will help them work towards both short and long term career goals and planning. Students will have the opportunity to embark on additional work experience, volunteer for charitable initiatives either at school or through external organisations, or participate in the school 'Trade Transition Program'. A note elaborating Careers Enterprise Week will be sent home to all parents/carers of Year 10 students in Week 3 and posted on the school's Facebook page. I'm excited to see our students working towards their career goals and showing the broader community what enterprising young individuals CPHS students are!

Finally, I'd like to make mention of some upcoming excursions and training I have planned and am in the process of planning. Inspiring the Future Australia is hosting an event on Monday 18th November 2019 called 'Inspiring Careers in Health'. Students in Years 9, 10 and 12 who have indicated an interest in careers in the health industry will be accompanied by two CPHS teachers to this fantastic event to hear from health professionals, receive career mentoring and learn about the opportunities and expectations of this industry. That same week on 21st November 2019 is Western Sydney 'U' Day at the Penrith WSU campus, where a group of Year 10 and 12 students will explore how a future at WSU can create unlimited opportunities. Furthermore, I'd like to thank all students seeking white card training for their patience as I work with local RTOs to get the best deal for students to complete this valuable training at a fair price. I am looking to run this training sometime during this term, more information will be made available as soon as possible - priority will be given to students who signed the expression of interest form.

RAISING THE BAR FOR SUCCESS

2019-2020 sees a Pilot Program: Raising the B.A.R. for Success being implemented. This mentoring program aims to support students by providing them with the skills needed to positively engage in school life by making positive choices, monitor and improve their attendance and build rapport and positive relationships with their teachers and peers. This in turn will lead to students achieving success in their learning and future career pathways.

Research has shown that mentoring has been linked with positive outcomes such as, a sense of belonging to the school community, improved engagement, higher attendance indicators and higher academic achievement. These factors all play an important role in developing positive self- esteem and wellbeing for young people.
